Finding a Topic

- Be precise and specific: Why is my topic important?
- Ideally base your thesis on work you have already done
- Start early
- Consider technicalities



Writing Process

- Plan on months for research
- Detailed outline/structure of the thesis
- → order of chapters → assign literature + quotes
- Proofread + plan schedule accordingly
- Consult with your lecturer!
- Check for consent on changes and length
- Do the bibliography right away
- Always do your introduction last

- Frequent backups! Always!!
- Pace yourself
