### COURSE | THE RISE OF VICTIMHOOD CULTURE

<b>Learning Objectives and Outcomes</b>	Ph.D. candidates should read the book and form their own opinion. During the course, they learn to distinguish analytical interpretation from critical evaluation. In likewise fashion, they become familiar with understanding and criticizing positive as well as normative arguments. Based on the practical syllogism, they learn to complement downstream and upstream reasoning. In sum, this course offers to improve one's techniques for text analysis and text discussion.
<b>Content</b>	Campbell and Manning (2018) have written an interesting book about current trends at US-American universities. As sociologists, they claim to observe a new kind of moral culture that blends elements of pre-modern honor cultures with modern enlightenment cultures. They critically discuss several features of this new "victimhood culture" and cover topics such as free-speech laws and controversies about value-free research. This book is especially valuable because it provides a sociological perspective on moral cultures that should be of interest for all kinds of business ethics.
<b>Teaching Methods</b>	The seminar will be a mixture of presentations and discussions.  (a) The first day will concentrate on reconstructing the whole book. Ph.D. candidates will introduce each of the nine book chapters with a short (5 minutes) presentation.  (b) The second day is reserved for criticisms. We will have an open discussion on the strengths and weaknesses of the book.
